## **CNSC** establishes more Academic and Laboratory Buildings

True to the College's vision of becoming a premier higher education institution in the Bicol Region, CNSC continues its physical facilities development in 2014 with the implementation of two infrastructure projects. These are: (1) Construction of Academic Building in Main Campus and (2) Establishment of the Science Building with Laboratory Room. The former, which is funded from income, amounted to P19,482, 000.00. The structure consists of 12 classrooms set to address the lack of classrooms in the Main Campus. After almost eight months of construction, the project was completed on December 13, 2014.

Meanwhile, the establishment of the Science Building with Laboratory Room which started on November 6, 2014, was expected to be completed on June 30, 2015. This project costs P 12,682,669.64 and was funded from the SUCs Capital Outlay for FY 2014. When finished, the building will house various engineering laboratories such as those for Electrical, Mechanical and Civil Engineering students.

Engr. Roger Jay de Vela, CNSC's faculty member and Institutional Planning & Development Officer, is the only Filipino who made it to the Beahrs Environmental Leadership Program for 2014, an international leadership course sponsored by the University of California-Berkeley.

The Beahrs Environmental Leadership Program (ELP), established in August 2000, is an annual Summer certificate course at UC Berkeley. It offers a unique learning opportunity for mid-career practitioners and decision-makers to broaden their knowledge and perspective on environmental and natural resource science, policy, management, and leadership.

Engr. De Vela had his eyes opened for international environmental and leadership affairs in July of 2014 when he was chosen to study abroad at UC Berkeley for three weeks. The selection process of the scholarship wasn't an easy one, each year the program administrator receives hundreds of applications from professionals around the world. Engr. with 44 other leaders from 35 countries including England, USA, Columbia, Australia and Switzerland, to name a few.

"All the things that I've learned will serve as an input to all planning initiatives that we are doing in the office," Engr. De Vela said when asked about the benefits CNSC will get out of his travel abroad. Through his exposure to the course's

innovative sustainability approaches and dialogues, Engr. De Vela developed the skills necessary to meet environmental and leadership goals. One of the skills he acquired is collaborative leadership when he acted as a facilitator on Conflict Management and Negotiation Workshop, "In this particular session, we were taught how to engage stakeholders into col-

laborative partnership."

Engr. De Vela's observation was "The faculty members of the UC Berkeley are very much serious and passionate with their profession, not just on instruction, but as well as in research and extension works not just in the country, but more especially in developing countries around the world." He believed that this practice can be applied in CNSC to enhance their culture of academic excellence but stressed that he can't do it alone. "Doing a thing on your own won't get you that far; you have to get everybody on board for the change you want to happen; you have to involve everyone..." Engr. De Vela furthered. He hopes that one day each member of the CNSC community will contribute to the efforts of making CNSC the premier higher education institution in the Bicol region.

Given another chance, Engr. De Vela will grab another opportunity to study abroad that in return will benefit the institution.

his words when asked why CNSC made a bold move to initialize its process last year. The said circular was from the Executive Order No.605, series of 2007 which orders all government agencies to implement and attain ISO 9001 QMS Certification by the Government Quality Management (GOMC)."ISO Committee certification 9001:2008 is part of our strategic plan for 2014-2020 but we were forced to start immediately because of the said executive order and other than that it is an automatic part of the PBB (Performance Based Bonus) 2014 indicator to measure the efforts of SUC's to be ISO certified. We cannot qualify if there will be no efforts," said by Mr. Roger Jay De Vela, the CNSC Quality Management Representative (QMR).

The ISO 9001:2008 QMS Certification is a continued government effort to the famous "tuwid na daan" which desires positive transformation of all government institu-

tions including the legislative, judiciary, and state-run universities. "When you are ISO certified, you are following international standard process which means the delivery of services is at par with the accepted international criterion," VPAA Abanto stated. ISO certification as guided by quality objectives guarantees excellent service to offer their clienteles. "We have the students as the best example of this, our top clientele. During enrollment, if that particular office entails them to wait 10-minutes for a specific transaction, then it should be done no longer than that. They get the best services

they can expect from a certain delivery unit," QMR De Vela continued. Falling short from these expectations would result to "non-conformance" which also follows a certain standard. The goal is to show that the institution strives to improve its services.

The realization of these goals lies in the hands of the people in it. "Even without ISO certification, the way of life of CNSC employees should follow culture of excellence," VPAA Abanto concluded as he encouraged everyone to actively participate in the journey to quality management.

Meeting on September 26, 2014 through Board Resolution No. 24 titled "Requests for authority to proceed with bidding for the project and authority to enter into contract with the construction of Entrance Pavilion with two-storey Entrepreneurship Buildings subject to Review of Estimate, Certify Funds allowed by the Board and come up with policies and maintenance."

This state-of-the-art frontage with two adjacent buildings approximately costs P64M, covering a total area of 480 sq. m.

Sixty square meters of this space in the ground floor, however, will be used as commercial spaces open for rent. Aside from being an income-generating project (IGP), it will also serve as an area where the College's production services would be showcased.

To be found on the second floor of the left wing building is a 240 sq. m. Amphitheater which can accommodate 150 persons during conventions, conferences and the likes. It has a pre-function lobby and a sound room.

The second floor of the right wing building will house a dormitory type hostel with eight dormitory rooms, each provided with CRs. It can accommodate transient visitors and guests.

In spite of issues on funding and project implementation, the construction of the College Pavilion will start in the first quarter of 2015 after all pre-engineering documents were completed.

eign consulting firm engaged in pathogenic infection control. CNSC and GICC LLC will identify and utilize Path-Away to search and evaluate potential agricultural applications in the Philippines. Path-Away® is a product of GICC LLC intended for infection control or antipathogen for both animal and

crop-based agricultural farming systems. GICC LLC will provide Path-Away concentrate for research purposes including engineering and logistical support to on-site training and expertise needed to organize proper dilution and application of concentrate for field application and/or consumer use.

## Labo Campus pushes through the establishment of a Diagnostic Center

To strengthen the agricultural science of the campus, a diagnostic center will be established soon at the Technology and Livelihood Center in Labo, Camarines Norte.

The said project is in line with the administration's aim at providing an available testing center for the research studies of all departments of CNSC. Once realized, the faculty members and students can do microbiological test, plant pest

and disease analysis, soil nutrient analysis, physico-chemical analysis of water, and plant tissue culture. The center will also accommodate test analyses from clientele as a form of an income generating project.

Aside from the main laboratory, a greenhouse will also be constructed for pathogenicity testing, evaluation of fungicides, and other disease control methods. Once the center becomes fully operational,

faculty members with relevant specializations will be designated as chemist, plant patholo-

gist, and entomologist. Laboratory and nursery aides will also be needed.

Behind this thrust towards an empowered research and development of the college is Dr. Arlene Alegre of CNSC-Labo.

Belaro, Planning Officer III, highlighted that: with the threats of climate change in agricultural production and agriculture's intensive inputs to sustain increasing demand for food, adaptations in agriculture to climate change through organic production is necessary. In connection with this, Ms. Marilyn C. Dasallas, Agriculturist II, encouraged organic agriculture technologies such as diversified farming. In addition, Mr. Arnold C. Claveron,

OA Forcal Person for Fisheries, pointed out that organic fish production is a promising venture. ### CNSC collaborates with ISO -Ateneo for Mangrove Management

The CNSC Mercedes Campus in compliance with its mandate to conduct Research & Extension activities enter into a collaborative research and extension program with the Institute of Social Order in Ateneo de Manila University. With this, the CNSC President, Dr. Monsito G. Ilarde together with the Mercedes Campus Director, Dr. Manuel B. Alberto, attended the project launching and Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) signing on Tripartite Partnership on August 22, 2014 at Ateneo de Manila University, Loyola Heights, Quezon City. The on-going project entitled Facilitating Mangrove Management is being implemented in partnership with the Bureau of Fisheries & Aquatic Resources. Regional Office V (BFAR V), the Integrated Fisheries and Aquatic Resources and Management Council of San Miguel Bay (IFARMC-SMB), Central Bicol State College President Ilarde and Mercedes Campus Director Alberto together with other officials during the MOA signing at Ateneo de Manila University.

University of Agriculture (CBSUA) and the Local Government Unit of Siruma, Camarines Sur, the identified beneficiary of the project in Bicol Region. The project spearheaded by the Ateneo de Manila University Institute of Social Order is funded by the Philippine Tropical Forest Foundation (PTFCF). The collaborative program envisions to establish an integrated sustainable eco-management zone encompassing Lamon Bay and San Miguel Bay. It aims to achieve this by forming alliances of bay-wide IFARMCs with mass base that is comprised of empowered and responsible fishers' organizations capable of partnering with local government units in implementing natural resources management.



To realize its goals, series of activities such as partnership meetings, review and finalization of plans, data gathering (socioeconomic and community mapping), and encoding are currently undertaken by the concerned agencies. Mangrove nursery establishment and management, writeshop and meetings, and farm planning and management training cum practicum are some of the future activities to be conducted by the group. CNSC is represented in this project by Dr. Manuel Alberto, Prof. Nelson S. Olfindo, Research Coordinator of Mercedes Campus and Mr. Noel C. Alegre, the College of Arts and Sciences Director of Social Policy Research.

# CNSC Labo conducts Awareness Seminar on Animal Waste Management and Utilization

In line with the mandate to promote organic agriculture and sustainable agricultural production, an awareness seminar dubbed as "Animal Waste Management and Utilization for Livestock Farmers in Labo, Camarines Norte" was conducted by the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources (CANR) of Camarines Norte State College (CNSC) on December 15, 2014 at the Technology and Livelihood Center of CNSC Labo Extension.

The said event envisions maximizing the usage of animal manure while minimizing its ill effects on human health and environment. Livestock industry nowadays, however, is dependent on the use of synthetic fertilizers for the production of feeds; hence, it indirectly con-



tributes to greenhouse gases as major cause of global warming. Promoting the utilization of animal wastes would therefore help in mitigating greenhouse gas production.

Funded by the Department of Agriculture Regional Field Unit V, 54 livestock growers from Labo and the rest of the province participated in the said seminar.

Prof. Bartolome S. Papares, Campus Director and the event chair, formally opened the event. Speakers included Prof. Juanita C. Emata on Contribution of Agriculture to Climate Change, Ms. Ginalyn R. Sabroso on Waste Manage-

ment, Ms. Rohilyn B. Egle on General Strategies on Reduction of Farm Wastes highlighting eco-friendly pig farming, Engr. Marie Joan Freyra on Mechanism of Conversion of Animal Wastes to Biogas, and Mr. Jifferey Velasco on Composting.

A training needs assessment was conducted before the seminar ends. Results showed that participants prioritize vermicomposting using animal wastes, production of lactic acid bacteria serum, and biogas production from animal wastes. These three components will serve as the focus of the program's training proper.
